4. PUBLIC INPUT ON CURRENT AGENDA ITEMS

Len McLean – Items covered in the trial program for physician recruitment from Thompson Regional Hospital District are 95% what Lynn Moyer put in place during the recent recruitment in Chase with funding from the Village. Mayor Berrigan extended thanks to Ms. Moyer and the recruitment committee.

Graham Bell – Regarding Business Licences – he is of the opinion that if you are going to be in business there is a need to realize there are associated costs. By some businesses not paying for a Licence it places a burden on those businesses that do so no business should be exempt. The majority of the fees go to the Chamber of Commerce who use funds to try to attract other businesses to the area.

Graham Bell – Schedule B of Bylaw 816 – 2016 *2016 to 2020 Financial Plan* states “The Village will continue to increase the water utility rates until the revenues fully fund the costs of providing the service” but there seems to be an existing surplus. The Director of Financial Services explained that it is misleading when looking at the statements as that line item is actually only close to breaking even. He also clarified that it is tracked separately.

Bill MacPherson – Spoke in support of some planned improvements on the Hysop Road Right-of-Way.

Kelly Esslinger – Does not understand why, after all these years, changes are being discussed to the Hysop Road Right-of-Way (RoW) and isn't certain what exactly changes are being proposed.

- Mayor Berrigan – there have been issues regarding inappropriate usage of the RoW which were brought to Council's attention. Funds were budgeted to try and clean up this area and make it convenient for smaller boats to be launched.
- Kelly Esslinger – a picnic table is a good idea but spending money on items such as parking, signage, no-posts is a waste.
- Mayor Berrigan – this item was brought to Council's attention so they are looking at ways to enhance the Village's property, just as they do in similar situations.
- Kelly Esslinger – by putting these items in place there is the potential to invite more trouble into the area.
- Councillor Lepsoe – queried what Mr Esslinger thought about launching boats at that spot.
- Kelly Esslinger – has used that spot for launching both larger and smaller boats but cautioned that larger boats can only be launched during the right seasons. There have been problems in the past with people trying to launch larger boats at the wrong time of year. As a taxpayer his opinion is that it should be left the way it is with possibly a picnic table.

Jack Esner – Has used the Hysop Road access to launch boats a number of times and notes you can only launch in Spring. The access is very useful for those mending docks as they can float them to the access boat, bring wood to that point and mend on site.

Beverly Murphy – agrees that the Hysop Road is public and has no issue with improvements being made. She recently paid to have a survey done on the area and believes the survey done by the Village is not accurate.

- The CAO noted a legal survey was done, however, she will check with the Supervisor of Public Works.

Dave Smith – it was clarified that there is no intent to install fencing in the area and access to personal property will still be allowed to some extent.

- Councillor Lepsoe requested further explanation – the CAO noted the intent is not to restrict those who already have access but to restrict public usage.

Rus Berzins – commended the Village on the plan to improve the Hysop Road area and has already seen the planting of one fruit tree. He hopes there will be a variety of fruit trees planted. He also noted the neighbour on the other side of the RoW has taken the initiative to put out bags and signage reminding people about picking up dog waste.

Kelly Esslinger – sounds like people like the RoW just the way it is but just would like to see it cleaned up a bit.

SHUSWAP LAKE SECURITY SERVICE (SLSS) LIMITED

Proposal for the Village of Chase, "Business & Residential Security Patrols"

SLSS is in its second year of business and services the North Shore and the Village of Chase. We have been primarily working on the North Shore and have expanded into the Village. We are currently servicing several businesses there. There are approximately seventy businesses and hundreds of homes that could benefit from this service.

This proposal is for the business areas, along with the residential homes within the Village. The patrols will be completed on random nights, four nights a week, (weekends included) between the hours of 6:00 PM and 6:00 AM. A well marked security vehicle and uniformed guards will perform these patrols. The guards will be looking for any suspicious activity or damage.

The funding for these patrols will be negotiated with the Village of Chase and the Chase Chamber of Commerce could solicit the businesses for additional funding. SLSS will work together and take direction from the Village, local RCMP and the "Citizens On Patrol" (COP). I have already made a presentation to the COP group. One of my guards has completed one patrol and covered the entire Village in two hours. This is going at a speed where proper observations can be made. Two patrols would take approximately four hours. I've attached a proposed schedule for **01 June 2016 to 31 December 2016**. This is at 4 patrols per week. It covers all the weekends and holidays including Halloween. The rate for each patrol is **\$30.00** per hour and breaks down as follows:

1. 7 months or 123 nights x 2 hours per night = 246 hours x \$30.00 per hour = **\$7380.00**
2. 7 months or 123 nights x 4 hours per night = 492 hours x \$30.00 per hour = **\$14,760.00**

Deterrence is the key to keeping the criminals from thinking they own the night. The citizens of Chase are fed up with the recent "crime wave", as reported in the last town hall meeting. This proposal would give the Village of Chase another means to deter the criminals preying on the hard earned property and give the citizens peace of mind to enjoy their community.




Dear Sirs:

Last week on a visit to Sorrento, I turned onto the Trans-Canada Highway at the east end of Chase, and encountered a bighorn sheep trotting eastbound on the Highway approaching the brow of the hill. With nowhere to pull over, I have no idea what happened when it encountered the oncoming traffic.

The Highways Minister, Todd Stone, is in the process of approving the design of the upgrades to the Trans-Canada Highway through Chase. Assuming he will need input from the Village, can you please suggest to the Minister that provision be made to fence off the south side of the Highway through Chase? There is a large herd of Bighorn Sheep on Scatchard Mountain to the south, who seem determined to wander on to the Trans Canada Highway in Chase. I have seen at least twenty grazing in the Catholic churchyard by the Shuswap Avenue access to the Highway, and I feel that keeping them on their own side of the Highway would be safer for both them and motorists alike.

With the upgrade costs running between \$10-\$20 million per kilometer I am sure that a small extra sum to include a fence on the new Highway upgrade to prevent them gaining access to this very busy stretch of road would be in order.

Safety is my ministry's highest priority, and I can assure you that our planning will consider the safety needs of both travellers as well as wildlife as we work to mitigate the impact of our infrastructure on the environment. The activities and movements of wildlife along the highway corridor are important to be aware of as we begin to develop improvement plans for this section of the Trans-Canada Highway.

The Ministry has installed warning signs in the area cautioning drivers to watch for bighorn sheep coming off the road faces near the highway.

AGLG ANNOUNCES DRINKING WATER AUDITEES

SURREY – The City of Kelowna and the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen will be audited by British Columbia's office of the Auditor General for Local Government (AGLG) on the topic "*Local Government's Role in Ensuring Clean Drinking Water*," AGLG Gordon Ruth announced today.

"The residents of every B.C. community have a strong interest in making sure they have access to safe, good-quality drinking water," said Ruth. "These performance audits will look at what local governments are doing to help make sure clean drinking water is available to their communities."

AGLG staff has begun the planning phase of the audits, which includes developing audit objectives and determining the scope and criteria for the audit.

The two selected auditees were among three local governments announced in 2014 by the previous AGLG to participate in audits on this topic. The previous list of auditees also included the Township of Spallumcheen.

"As part of our assessment of the office following my appointment, we reviewed the local governments previously selected for these audits," said Ruth. "We considered factors such as geographical location, drinking water sources and systems and other community characteristics. I concluded that we will begin with performance audits of one municipality and one regional district and consider whether to add other local governments on this audit topic at a later time."

AGLG staff is also conducting audits of four other local governments on the topic "Managing the Inherent Risks of Limited Human Resources within Small Local Governments." Auditees on that topic include the City of Fernie, City of Nelson, District of Port Edward and District of Squamish.

The AGLG's Annual Service Plan describes the performance audit planning process in detail. To date, the office has released a total of 21 reports, including 17 performance audit reports and four AGLG Perspectives booklets. These reports and the office's Annual Service Plan are available on the AGLG website (www.aglg.ca).

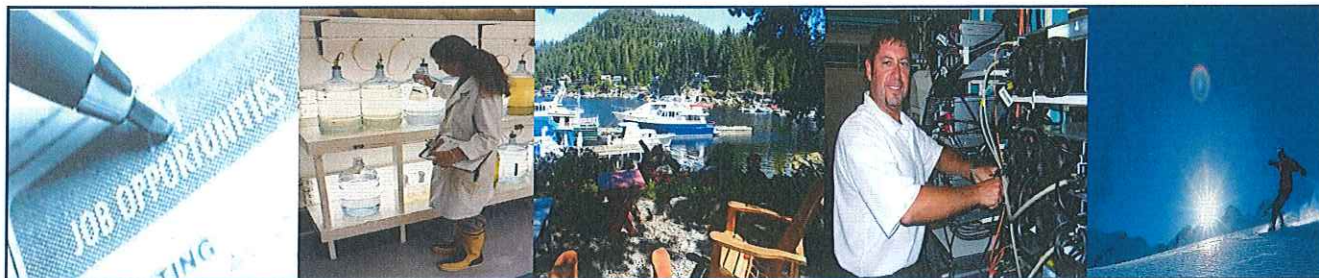



Provincial River Outlook

Weather over the past week has continued to be unsettled. Yesterday a cold upper low crossed into the province bringing cooler temperatures and 10 to 30 mm of rain in the Peace and Upper Fraser basins. River levels have fluctuated over the past week due to continued snow melt driven by warm temperatures last weekend and rainfall this week.

The province's snow pack continues to melt at an accelerated rate, with mid-May conditions being more typical of snow pack that is normally observed in mid-June.

Weather over this weekend is expected to be relatively dry for most of the province, with potential for showers in the south east and central interior. Temperatures will be seasonal and will warm up late in the weekend in the north. A continued cycle of unsettled conditions is forecast through next week.

River levels are expected to increase today and Friday in the southern interior, Kootenay and Peace regions. Elsewhere, flows are forecast to continue to gradually subside through the weekend and early next week. There is minimal flood risk at this time.

Freshet information, including current streamflow conditions and hydrologic model output is available on the River Forecast Centre [website](#).

The [River Forecast Centre](#) continues to monitor conditions and will provide updates as conditions warrant. The next *Provincial River Outlook* will be issued on Thursday May 26th, unless conditions change significantly. The next Snow Bulletin will be issued on Tuesday, May 24th.
